



Voter Awareness Month

This April, the Parliamentary Registry will observe Voter Awareness Month under the theme **“Voting: A Right. A Responsibility. A Choice.”**

Voting is more than a single day on the calendar; it is how we shape the future of our community. Voter Awareness Month serves as a reminder that every eligible Bermudian’s voice matters.

Throughout April, the Parliamentary Registry team will visit high schools across Bermuda to meet with students aged 17 and 18,

providing information on the electoral process and assisting those who are eligible with voter registration. The goal is to ensure young people feel informed, confident, and prepared when it comes to voting.

Additional outreach will include a visit to Vision Bermuda and the hosting of a candidate workshop, encouraging broader participation in Bermuda’s democratic process.

When we recognize voting as both a right and a responsibility, we strengthen our democracy together.

Democracy in Action

Every election tells a story, but some stories span generations. In the 2025 General Election, Bermuda’s oldest voter, Mrs. Eva Outerbridge, a resident of Constituency 15 Pembroke East, cast her ballot at 104 years old, proving that civic engagement truly has no age limit.

Earlier this month the Parliamentary Registry team visited her home to present her with flowers and a commemorative plaque recognizing her as the oldest voter in the 2025 General Election. Surrounded by her daughter and granddaughter, both proud voters themselves, the moment reflected a powerful family legacy of participation.

Amendments made to the Parliamentary Election Act, in 2020, allow the Parliamentary Registry teams to visit voters who are sick and shut-in, in their homes, to cast their ballots. Mrs. Outerbridge, among many others, took advantage of this service and was able to cast her vote from the comfort of her own home. Her experience highlights Bermuda’s ongoing commitment to ensure accessibility to voting, is available to every eligible Bermudian, regardless of circumstance.

As we look ahead to the next generation of voters, may her example inspire all of us, especially our young people, to understand the power of their voice. Because whether you are voting for the first time or the fiftieth, your participation matters. Voting is not just a right. It is a responsibility. And it is always a choice.
